Executive Producer Patrick Aiello was the Head of Production and Executive Vice President of Creative Affairs at Hyde Park when Joyce Jun of Katten Law introduced "Leonie" to the company.

Aiello and Jun had enjoyed a previous working relationship on the feature film "Street Fighter: The Legend of Chun Li" from the Japanese video game producer Capcom. The American/Japanese coproduction was a successful endeavor and distributed by 20th Century Fox. Jun was pleased to introduce "Leonie" as a flow-up American/Japanese co-production.

Upon Aiello's first read of director/co-writer Hisako Matsui and co-writer David Wiener's screenplay, the project became an immediate priority to produce and assemble an appropriate cast with worldwide appeal.

Aiello met with Matsui and Jun at Katten Law offices where he pitched how his involvement would move the casting process forward. Aiello was asked to meet again where he discussed why he was so attracted to the material.
