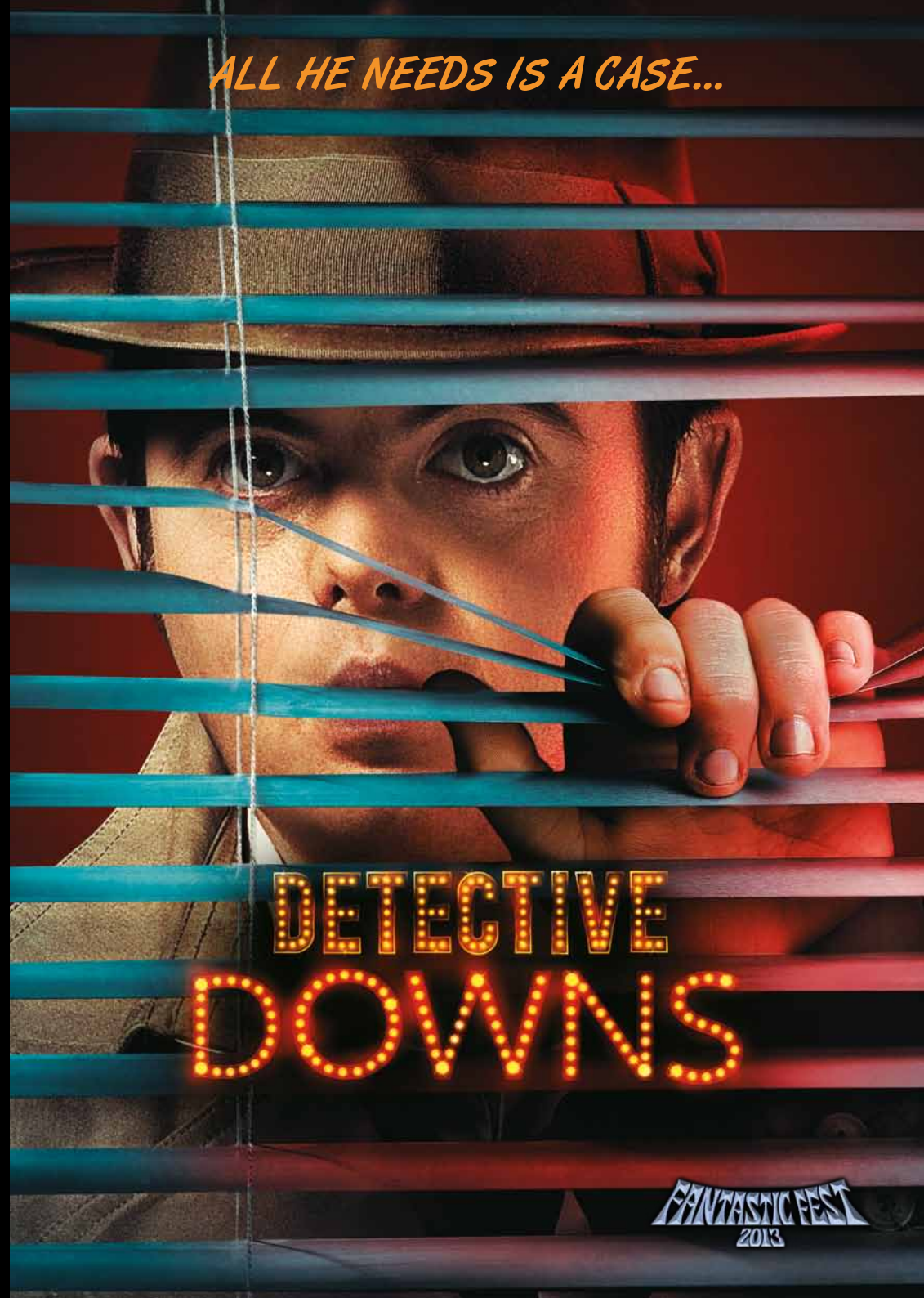

SYNOPSIS

Robert is perfect for the job, and soon he is entangled in Olav's secret life - and not without danger. But when Robert reveals his investigation method everyone's in for a surprise.

DIRECTOR'S BIOGRAPHY

Bård Breien's first short film FRANK'S PROLAPSE (2003) about a topredo with a backage was nominated for an Amanda Award. THE ART OF NEGATIVE THINKING (2006) marked his feature film debut, both as screenwriter and director. The film won several international awards, including Czeck Lion for Best Foreign Film in 2007, Best Director at the Karlovy Vary Film Festival, Best Film at the Nordische Filmtage in Lübeck and Best Screenplay at the Torino Film Festival. THE ART OF NEGATIVE THINKING is put up as a theatre play in several countries and in 2006 it was the most seen Scandinavian movie in German cinemas with more than 120.000 admissions.
